SURGICAL TRAINING

East Africa has a critical lack of surgeons, especially ENTs. There are not enough surgeons to train the next generation, meaning this problem will only get worse without our help. By partnering with the national ENT residency program and the **Pan African Academy of Christian Surgeons**, we are making strides to empower Africans to provide ENT healthcare for their people for generations to come.



PATIENT CARE

We are committed to serving the poor in the name of Jesus. Over 4,000 patients a year have been served in the ENT clinic, and I have completed **over 500 operations** for patients that had nowhere else to turn. Because we have advanced equipment and capabilities, Kijabe Hospital now receives patient referrals from all over the continent, spreading the Kingdom far wider than our small village.



DISCIPLESHIP

Every surgical resident in our program has pledged to work at a mission hospital after graduation. **Equipping these surgeons to proclaim Jesus** to their patients and colleagues all over Africa is the cornerstone of our mission to evangelize the nations. From weekly Bible studies to morning chapel and training in patient-centered witnessing, our residents are firmly rooted in the Gospel.

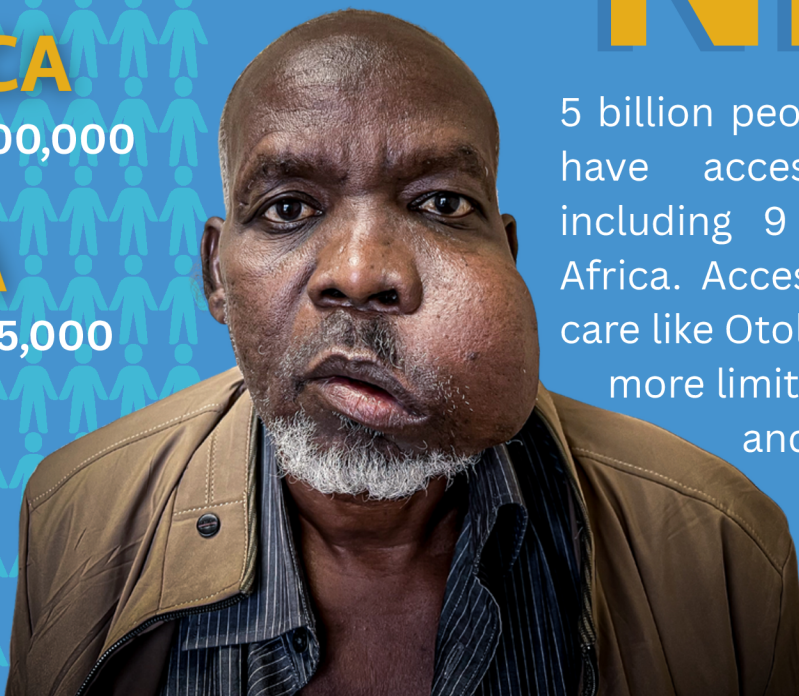

THE NEED

5 billion people in the world do not have access to safe surgery, including 9 out of 10 people in Africa. Access to speciality surgical care like Otolaryngology is even more limited for the poor in Kenya and around Africa.



16.9 million people die every year due to lack of surgery

Dabaab refugee camp houses over 400,000 Somali refugees in northern Kenya, many whom come to Kijabe for care

Over 200 patients were baptized in the past year by the hospital chaplains

AIC-Kijabe Hospital is a 363 bed referral hospital located an hour north of Nairobi in a small farming village. We live among the Kikuyu people, and engage in community development projects like starting a church library. Beyond the community, patients from all over Kenya and the surrounding countries come to Kijabe for care. In a country where the poor have very few options for healthcare, Kijabe stands as a testament to God's heart for the poor.
